Returned From The Front: Researching a Repatriated Battlefield Cross.



This grave marker turned up at the RMP museum around September 2017 as part of Nick Stone's survey of repatriated grave markers from the First World War. A cross from a unknown burial from the 1/24<sup>th</sup> London Regiment. For details of the survey project see: <a href="https://thereturned.co.uk/">https://thereturned.co.uk/</a>

As the creator of Geoff's Search Engine (GSE), I was asked to try to help determine the cemetery from where this marker was taken. We'd had some success tracing the original location of a few crosses, it depends on how common the GRU reference is. I intended to write up the search method used back then, so here it is some years later!


Using GSE it is possible to find burials from a particular cemetery, plot and row, if they are of the common form: plot.row.grave. For example VIII. A. 9 which is common in cemeteries with several plots. This is obviously not practical with the number of cemeteries in France and Belgium to find a particular cross location. I had attempted to search for this cross back then, but it was not conclusive and my data was not up to date. Now the data is updated, I decided to try again. The first problem is the Graves Registration Unit (GRU) tag is not clear, is it 7 C 17 or 7 G 17 m leaning towards the latter.

Having an updated set of data from CWGC and using an off-line search of the data using a short query program, which needs to do two things. First produce a list of all cemeteries which have a plot 7 and a row G, then find all cemeteries which have a known burial in grave 17 and remove these from the list. This takes about 2 minutes of computer time, but very much longer to write the code!. The CWGC database accessible to the public only consists of identified burials, so to find the grave for this cross it is required to locate a known burial in the same plot and row. (I'm sure CWGC have unknown burial plots in their database but there is no public access to these). Once you have found a known burial for each cemetery in the list, it is simply a case of tediously, manually examining the grave registration unit documents on the CWGC search feature to check every plot 7 and row G from our putative cemetery list.

GSE can be used to search the plot (7 entered as VII) and row (G) for each cemetery from the above list. For TINCOURT NBC:



This search produces a list of casualties in row G of plot 7:

We look for a nearby casualty, there is one in VII. G. 16 and select this CWGC record to examine the original GRU documents. We note there is an unknown British Soldier in grave 17, but of an unknown regiment so it is probably not our grave marker which is for a soldier of the 1/24<sup>th</sup> London Regiment. Row G produced a cemetery list of about 30 possible cemeteries and similar for row C. So the only option is to 'soldier on' and manually check each cemetery in our list. Had the GRU tags been less usual, for example the first one identified was 58 E 47 (plot 58, row E, grave 47), which only appears in one cemetery – Tyne Cot Cemetery, it would be an easy task, see:

If a row only holds unknown burials then it is impossible to identify the grave since there are no known burials on which to pull up the GRU documents and this may be a possibility.

It may also occur that a row covers more than one page in the GRU document, if the row is long or if there are several rows per page and the page we want has no identified burials, so cannot be called up from the CWGC search result page. There is a possibility in such a case to look at the URL of one of the pages and adjust the URL page number to get to the adjacent page. In the example below, grave 17 is on the previous page:





We find grave 17 on the previous page, which is on a page of unknowns, so not normally accessible to us. An unknown British soldier, but no regiment recorded, so not likely to be our man from 1/24<sup>th</sup> Londons.



All cemetery searches from both lists were inconclusive, but there is one possible grave. In Warlencourt British Cemetery there is a unknown British soldier of the 1/23<sup>rd</sup> London Regiment. In VII. G. 17. Could this be our man? – there were errors, some corrected, in the GRU documents. These burials were all exhumed, so were presumably originally identified by shoulder titles, so unlikely to be any confusion between 23 and 24, but humans make errors sometimes.

There is also the possibility that the grave marker was from a cemetery with a row populated with all unknowns, which we can't find with the available information.

This cross has a less common plot and row 13. H. There are only nine cemeteries with this reference, and the original grave is easily found at Serre Road Cemetery No 2, Plot 13, Row H, Grave 14:



Rows of length 10 and 13 seem to be common and cemeteries with these often appear in the list of cemeteries to search and can only be rejected by manual examination where the wanted grave number is higher.



A search for this grave reference found 8 locations where the row length was 10 or less and five unknown soldiers. Four of these had an identified regiment, only one was wholly unidentified at St. Mary's A.D.S. Cemetery, Haisnes in plot XIII. B. 11.

Summary of locations. There was a theory that all crosses could have been from Tyne Cot Cemetery – clearly this is not the case.

#### Notes.

3-B-13 and 3-B-14 are UBS in Tyne Cot Cemetery but other locations not searched.

Possible other matches with high number of locations.

3-A-3 no GRU documents found for Tyne Cot , could be all unknowns in row A. 55-K-11 does not exist in Tyne Cot Cemetery.

2-G-4 does not exist in Tyne Cot Cemetery.

O-L-7 is possibly a field burial reference which used letters, rather than a cemetery plot/row reference.

# WOODEN CROSSES FROM WAR GRAVES.

## GIFT TO RELATIVES.

The Imperial War Graves Commission announce that when the temporary wooden crosses that mark the graves of officers and men abroad are replaced by permanent memorials, it will not be possible to preserve beyond a certain time those that are not re-

quired by the relatives.

Next-of-kin who wish these wooden crosses to be sent to them are therefore requested to apply to the Secretary, Imperial War Graves Commission, Winchester House, St. James's-square, S.W.1, before September 1, stating the address to which the cross is to be sent and giving the usual particulars regarding the soldier on whose grave it is erected. It will be a convenience if the name of the cemetery is also given.

The wooden cross will be sent in due course, though not for some time, and the secretary should be kept

informed of any change of address.
